# **COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

This course provides a broad coverage of the political landscape of countries in Latin America. It involves comparing and contrasting institutions and aspects of government performance in different countries, and analyzing their differences against the backdrop of social and demographic attributes. The first part of the course introduces students to the dominant actors in Latin American politics and situates them within a general history of development in the region; the second part examines specific countries in greater detail and provides students with the contextual information to understand each country relative to others in the region. The goal of the course is to characterize the politics of the region as a whole, and at the same time to elucidate the unique paths of political development that each country has taken. As a result, students will better understand the intricacies of politics within Latin America, as well as the generalizability of politics in the region.

# **EXPECTED LEARNING OUTCOMES:**

As a result of the class, students will be able to:

- Develop a working knowledge of historical and contextual specificities in Latin America
- Identify dominant actors and institutions in Latin American politics
- Critically evalute the similarities and differences of goverments in Latin America
